
Dear Friend,

REFLECTION BY STEPHEN J FYSON PHD PRINCIPAL CONSULTANT





As educators, we hear a lot of talk about motivation. We are told that our teachers are better practitioners if they can increase the motivation of our students. We are told that food can have an impact on student motivation. We are told that technology can have an impact on student motivation. We are told that room structures can have an impact on student motivation.

Certainly, there are kernels of truth in all of these reflections. However, our students, like our teachers, are not machines or animals. They cannot be engineered to be better learners. They cannot be trained by instinct to be better learners.

The people in our communities can be *invited* to reflect on their deepest desires. These desires can be reflected in whether or not they wish to explore the purpose of what they are learning. That is, what will they do with what they learn? That is a question of the heart, which is driven by what Jonathan Edwards called our 'Religious Affections'. CS Lewis reflected on the basic choice we have this way:

...the Christian thinks any good he does comes from the Christ-life inside

him. He does not think God will love us because we are good, but that God will make us good because He loves us. (61)

Biblically, motivation is understanding where we place our treasures. That is where our heart is. We can invest in treasure that are in response to God's mercy, or not. Living in response to this mercy is what invites the Christ-life into us. That is the deepest 'motivation' our students and teachers can have – a heart committed to learning how to share the gifts that God has given each one of us.

May God give us the grace to see more clearly the hearts of our students and teachers. That will be the greatest motivation factor we can study in our work.
